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# West Austin Studio Tour Weekend 2: Our picks and highlights

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Rain didn't dampen the first weekend of the West Austin Studio Tour.

Among the delights seen out and about on the tour were several pop-up exhibits — proof once again that despite Austin's rising rents and rapid gentrification, artists will find a way to creatively exhibit their work.

### "Pop-Up" at Neill-Cochran House Museum, 2310 San Gabriel St. nchmuseum.org

How clever is this? The historic Neill-Cochran House Museum is one of Austin's hidden gems, a grand Greek Revival mansion dating back to 1855 that's now surrounded by the busy West Campus neighborhood. To ignite a little interest, the museum invited 10 painters for a temporary exhibit, each commanding one of the historically furnished rooms as an intimate gallery. There's plenty of free parking behind the museum, too, on its tree-shaded grounds.

"Youngsons: Live Free With Guys." Co-Lab Projects' Demo Gallery, 721 Congress Ave. colabprojects.org

For the next year, the indie art presenters Co-Lab Projects will occupy the first floor of the long-empty 721 Congress Ave., a rundown building slated for demolition. Hence the moniker "Demo Gallery." An exuberant exhibit by the collaborative painting duo of Drew Liverman and Michael Ricioppo debuts the space.

Sarah Bork and Kat McTee., 4614 Jinx Ave. sarahborkhamilton.com; artcloth.com

Fused plastic bags are the fodder for Sarah Bork's alternative quilts. A savvy fabric artist, Kat McTee combines printing techniques and obsessive hand embroidery to create images of long-lost landscapes.

Virginia Fleck and Yuliya Lanina. 1900 Larchmont Drive. virginiafleck.com; yuliyalanina.com

Repurposing plastic bags, Virginia Fleck creates colorful wall collages that are beautiful yet trenchant reminders of consumer waste. Yuliya Lanina's surreal and sly paintings always delight.

Valerie Fowler infuses her intricate paintings, which are inspired by nature, with plenty of whimsy.

In an itty-bitty studio on a strangely numbered half street in the Clarksville neighborhood, Marjorie Moore has accumulated a vast collection of natural and non-natural found objects that inform her collages with a curious combination of the odd and the contemporary.
